Junior sports associations up and down the country are being encouraged to take action against abusive parents at school sporting events. **0.....K..** Evidence suggests that such conduct is having a detrimental effect on both behaviour and participation levels in school sport.

I recently attended a nephew's under-ten football match. **1.....** The level of abuse reduced the child to tears in front of his teammates and the spectators. I told the bully he should be ashamed of himself but he just laughed and said the kid had to "toughen up".

Sadly, it would seem that this is not an isolated incident. **2.....** The result has been a worrying increase in the number of junior players dropping out of competitive sport at school. This is indeed a worrying trend when you consider the reports stating that our children are not getting sufficient amounts of exercise.

A concerned parent informed me that his daughter had been having nightmares after being repeatedly criticised by the mother of another player for making mistakes in a basketball game. **3.....** She's grateful to him and now does aerobics twice a week, which is obviously a lot less stressful.

A further negative effect of this phenomenon has been on some of the

adults involved in school sport. **4.....** It thus comes as no surprise to learn that it is becoming increasingly challenging to recruit suitable match officials. Who needs the aggravation, especially when you normally don't even get paid for giving up your time?

However, it's not only the refs, as school coaches are also becoming reluctant to work with teams. **5.....** She told me that she was sick and tired of pushy parents shouting at her during games, criticising tactics and calling for certain players to be substituted.

She also says that all of this is having an adverse impact on standards of behaviour on and off the field or court. **6.....** Where are they getting this attitude from? It does not take a genius to work out that those on the sidelines are setting a bad example.

It is against this background that the authorities have been compelled to act. **7.....** If they persist in what they are doing, they will be asked to leave.

Obviously, enforcement is a challenge, but by-laws are being pushed through that would allow banning orders to be issued. **8.....** After all, at the end of the day, it is only a game and kids should be allowed to get on with it and enjoy themselves.
